John calls people to repent, to clear the decks, to completely reorder their lives so that nothing gets in the way of the Lord's coming. The reading from Isaiah gives the context for this radical call: the assurance of forgiveness that encourages us to repent; the promise that the coming one will be gentle with the little ones. Isaiah calls us all to be heralds with John, to lift up our voices fearlessly and say, "See, your God is coming!" We say it to one another in worship, in order to say it with our lives *in a world in need of justice and* peace.



Mission the Month LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Bethlehem's December Mission of the Month is Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR).

LDR shares God's hope, healing and renewal with people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, LDR stays to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

When selecting our December Mission of the Month, the Church in Society Committee felt it was important to consider an organization who is directly working to support the humanitarian crisis in the Holy Land. We knew LDR would be a trusted organization for our funds. On November 17th, LDR posted the following on their Facebook page:

Situation: The humanitarian crisis continues to worsen - almost 70% of Gazan residents are displaced, and resources such as food, water and medical supplies are in short supply.

Response: Lutheran Disaster Response is supporting Augusta Victoria Hospital, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and ACT Alliance to provide relief for people impacted by the crisis in the Holy Land. In the United States, Lutheran Disaster Response is supporting Salam Arabic Church and Mother of the Savior Church to provide emotional and spiritual care to Palestinian communities.

While the crisis in the Middle East was our initial reason for selecting Lutheran Disaster Response, LDR will direct Bethlehem's Mission of the Month offerings to where it is needed most at the time, they receive our financial gift. LDR is currently providing support in the following areas:

Advent Reflection

"Tell me the weight of a snowflake," a sparrow asked a wild dove.

"Nothing more than nothing," was the answer.

"In that case, I must tell you a marvelous story," the sparrow said. "I sat on the branch of a fir, close to its trunk, when it began to snow, not heavily, not in a raging blizzard, no, just like in a dream, without any violence. Since I didn't have anything better to do, I counted the snowflakes settling on the twigs and needles of my branch. Their number was exactly 3,741,952. When the next snowflake dropped onto the branch-nothing more than nothing, as you say-the branch broke off.."

Having said that, the sparrow flew away.

The dove thought about the story for awhile and finally said to herself: "Perhaps there is only one person's voice lacking for peace to come about in the world."

As we approach winter, I thought it might be timely to talk about falling snowflakes instead of green blades rising. And so I ask this question. Do we dare to dream today that maybe there is just one more word or action needed to make good and loving creation care a reality? At this moment what we are doing is more like a bunch of snowflakes falling on the branch-nothing more than nothing-as the dove said. Still, the branch would not have broken except for the 3,741,952 snowflakes that had fallen on it before the last snowflake broke the branch.

This month, a new church year begins as we observe Advent, a time of waiting with anticipation. We remember that the people of Israel had been waiting for their Messiah for many centuries and had not given up hope. The city of Bethlehem was waiting to receive him. The angels were waiting to announce his birth to shepherds in the field, of all people. And, on that first Christmas night over two thousand years ago, it happened. The Christ child came into our world. The hopes and dreams of all people were fulfilled.

The Advent season and its message reminds us to hold onto our hope. We know that we are snowflakes falling on the branch. We know that not enough has yet fallen to break the branch. We wait with anticipation for the day when that last snowflake falls. We don't know yet what the last snowflake will be. It might just be an accumulation of all that has come before. It might be a scientist who finds a new way to sequester carbon in the atmosphere. It might be that the youth of today will produce the type of leadership and commitment to make it happen. But hope is what we have. It is as necessary for life as is breathing. That is why we do what we do. We have a creator God who has redeemed all of his creation and continues his creative and redeeming work among us.

A blessed Advent and Christmas season to all. May hope continue to abound with you!

How to Support Bereaved Children Over the Holidays: A Tip Sheet for Parents and Caregivers



The holidays can be a particularly difficult time of year for children grieving the loss of a loved one. For most children and families, the holiday season is a happy time that they look forward to all year. But after experiencing the death of a loved one, holiday gatherings can be especially difficult. Being

around people, places, or situations that are reminders of the deceased can be emotionally painful for bereaved families, including both parents and children. Being a bereaved parent can be especially challenging because it involves dealing with your own grief reactions while also managing your child's grief. Based on our work with bereaved families and recent research findings, this tip sheet provides suggestions about how parents and other caregivers can help their bereaved children cope with the holiday season. Although some suggestions may seem overwhelming at first (especially if you have lost someone recently), trying each suggestion out,one by one, can help both parents and their kids.
