#### We have been left without!

Without any advanced communication, Bethlehem has been dropped by the snow shoveling service which we depended on the last couple of years. (They notified us yesterday!)



Do you know of any service or persons who could do this?

Our criteria is to shovel all sidewalks, entryways, and curb to street areas after each snowfall (2" or more). Weekdays and Sundays by 9am

The biggest complaint we have had with the shoveling service is that it may require "after care" shoveling. Meaning: the snow plows leave a hump on the side of the street with their street clean up processes causing the sidewalks/curbs need to be re-shoveled to make it open for passage. This has been a safety issue and claimed "reason" that we have been left without reliable snow shoveling service.

#### Now, what do we do?


First: BE SAFE! In the event that the sidewalks are not shoveled upon arrival, please take caution when entering the church.

Second: We have shovels posted in the each of the entryways. If it is within your capacity, we ask that you shovel a path until it can be taken care of.

Third: Spread the word that we are looking to hire someone to do this job. If you know of anyone, please talk to them and pass the information to Pastor Calvin or Mike Chmelik.

Reminder: During the work hours the door by the offices is unlocked. The alley door is opened before meetings, etc., but is not always reliably open. There is a sign on every door with the phone number of the church and you can call to get the door open while you wait. (If you have a cell phone.)

- Feminine hygiene
- Paper products such as toilet paper, facial tissue and paper towels
