












As one of my Bible teachers put it, "Psalm 23 is the essential text for the daily life of faith." Why? Because it works. Many a saint has had these words read, spoken, or prayed as they breathed their last. Many of the grief stricken have been soothed by these words as they lay to rest those they love.

Even Jesus used this Psalm as the basis for his proclamation that Jesus was the good shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep. Even Jesus believes this Psalm 23 is essential for living. I think we can take that as a pretty good recommendation.

My sense is that among ourselves and most of the people we encounter each day, there is this kind of spiritual "angst". "Angst" is a German word, most famously used by the theologian Soren Kierkegaard, meaning, "anxiety." A kind of restlessness of our souls that is reaching out for some reassurance or comfort.

Especially, as we emerge from the angst of the extraordinary circumstances of the past couple of years. We have survived, but it hasn't been easy. Now what? Will a new virus find us? We have lost so much. What do we do now?

Call now!

Psalm 23 is waiting for you.

So, if a little reassurance is what you're looking for, then Psalm 23 delivers.

Feeling down? Life a little uncertain? Your friends are acting a little strange? Tired of divisions? Parents getting on your nerves. Wondering when the other shoe is about to drop? Anxious, but don't know why?

If so, try a dose or two of Psalm 23. Take whole or just a verse or two at a time. Read. Listen. Breath. Pray. Repeat. Guaranteed to reduce your stress level and open your eyes to the reality of God's presence with you right now, right here. It will heal you. In fact, this is so good, this

Psalm 23 has never failed to take broken human hearts and teach our hearts to trust in God's promise to never let us down.

And best of all it's free. It just requires the tiniest sliver of your time, which pays you back 1000 times more than you'll ever put into it. Any takers?

Still unsure? This Psalm is so good, it puts the words right in your mouth. It oozes trust from every sentence. The Lord is my Shepherd. I shall not want. You prepare a table before me. My cup overflows. Trust me. It works. You too can trust God in your time of need or any time for that matter.



Do you remember Psalm 1 – the beautiful psalm that talks about you being a tree firmly planted by streams of water? Verse 2 goes like this:

"but their delight is in the law of the Lord and on his law they meditate day and night."

The word meditate has been explained to me as meaning "chewing the cud". The idea is to ruminate or chew food over and over – in the Psalms, the food being the word of God! King David likens himself to a ruminating cow! He takes a Scripture and ruminates over it to understand what God is saying to him.

I was in a Bible study that took a 6-month hiatus. We liked to ruminate – chew the cud – over the scriptures for the upcoming Sunday service.

As we read & discussed the scriptures for the Sunday service, we found it deepened our contemplation of the passages before hearing them on Sunday. There were such good insights shared & generally just wonderful fellowship.

A couple of us have really missed it, so this week we are resuming our Bible study. We meet on **Wednesdays** from 12:30–1:30. our first one this Wednesday Mau

Parker grew up in Grand Marais. Following graduation from Cook County High School, he attended school at LSC in Duluth to become an electrician and worked for North Shore Electric.


Together they own and operate The Fisherman's Daughter, at Dockside Market in Grand Marais.
