The Beginning of the Good News

But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking' for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." Mark 16: 6-7

I love the abrupt way St. Mark shares the resurrection story because the women who come to the tomb on Easter morning are told that the reason Jesus isn't there is because he has better things to do than wait around. 'You're looking' for Jesus of Nazareth? Sorry ... you just missed him.'

According to this gospel, the risen Christ isn't interested in waiting around while we ponder whether or not we believe in something as unexpected as resurrection. Instead, the women are instructed to go tell the disciples that they'd better get a move on. If it's Jesus they're looking for, they'll need to hit the road.

Being summoned to follow Jesus back to Galilee is an invitation for us to reimagine everything we think we know about him. It's our opportunity to reappraise the whole gospel narrative in light of this unexpected ending.

Living the resurrection means entering into an entirely new kind of life that refuses to acknowledge death as the last word. It means entering into a life in which God is always at work within us; redeeming all of creation and transforming the church into a place where all are welcome. Living the resurrection means loving others as we are loved; not just the 'others' whom we have something to gain by loving, but also those who've been marginalized by this world. We are to love the unlovable and touch the untouchable. We are to lift up those who are spat upon because of their addiction, poverty, infirmity, gender expression, politics, or failed relationships.

Following Jesus from the empty tomb to Galilee requires us to feed the hungry without asking why. It requires us to proclaim peace when all we can see around us is conflict. It requires us to be voices of compassion in a world that reflexively kicks the weak to the curb. It requires us to forgive and to love others just as we are forgiven and loved.

St. Mark shares a different kind of Easter joy than what we're perhaps used to hearing. It's a joy that calls us to go out and live the great commission despite our misgivings, despite our fears, despite our uncertainties, and despite our lack of perfect faith so that others will experience God's relentless love for this world alongside us.

The story of what God is doing in and through Jesus doesn't end at the empty tomb. That's where the real story begins. Remember, this is the gospel that begins with the words, 'The beginning' of the g'ood news of Jesus Christ the son of God.' Every word of Mark's gospel looks ahead to what lies beyond that empty tomb so that we can follow Jesus to Galilee, and through our own resurrected Hallelvjah lives, transform this broken world.





Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday

On April 2nd, Palm Sunday, we encounter the paradox that defines our faith: Jesus Christ is glorified king and humiliated servant. We too are full of paradox: like Peter, we fervently desire to follow Christ, but find ourselves afraid, denying God. We wave palms in celebration as Christ comes into our midst, and we follow with trepidation as his path leads to death on the cross. Amid it all, we are invited into this paradoxical promise of life through Christ's broken body and outpoured love in a meal of bread and wine. We begin this week that stands at the center of the church year, anticipating the completion of God's astounding work.



Our Palm/Passion Sunday service will be led by Jon-

athan Rova. The Confirmation Students will set up the **Faith Walk** for parishioners, so they can walk through the **Stations of the Cross**. This will be up in the sanctuary through Good Friday and you are invited to come during the week for private time of meditation in the sanctuary.



Maundy Thursday

The evening of **April 6th** our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to **ce**

Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. This night we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, after the stripping of the altar, we anticipate the coming days.



Traditionally, this is the time when 3rd—4th graders participate in Communion classes, partake in a Sader meal with their families, and take their First Communion in the service. This year we have postponed this until we have a new pastor.

The youth of the church (Sunday school through Confirmation classes) are asked to help with the stripping of the altar at the end of the service.



Life and death stand side by side as we enter into **Good Friday**. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at

the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is

indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

This service will be at 6:00 pm and lay members will read the traditional lessons and prayers associated with the passion and death of Christ.

Resurrection of Our Lord: Easter Day



This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! Indeed, "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34): Christ's resurrection truly brings life to everyone. We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love in the feast of holy communion. With the women at the tomb, we are astonished, elated, and grateful. We depart with joy to proclaim the good news of God's endless love.

Again this year we will celebrate Easter during two services: 8:00 am and 10:00 am and will be led by the Reverend John Bragstad.

cultures experienced a sense of something more powerful than humans. Gradually, the stories and beliefs in gods evolved to an un-

derstanding of the concept of one God. Three major religions, Judaism, Christianity and Islam developed from this concept.

Karen Armstrong then goes on to explore the ways these three religions grew, frequently from numinous experiences by individuals we all are familiar with, such as Isaiah, Moses, and Abraham. She describes the development through the centuries of these three major religions as they evolved in their specific cultures, and how their ideas of worship and living were greatly influenced by philosophy, science and mystical experiences.

In her conclusion, she stresses the need to keep our faith alive saying, "Human beings cannot endure emptiness and desolation ..."

I greatly enjoyed reading this book. Luckily it has a glossary in the back, as there were words quite new to me, but don't we all need to challenge our brains a bit?"



Greetings from the Call Committee! My name is Nathan Kristenson. I'm the chair of the Call Committee and we would like to let you know where we are in the call process.

We have been meeting to prepare to interview potential candidates. This is a confidential process so we won't be able to give you the names of any candidates or any information that would potentially identify a candidate. We will be able to let you know when we are interviewing.

Where do the names of candidates come from?

The first place is the ELCA and our NE MN Synod. Pastors seeking a call can look at these websites and find congregations that are seeking a pastor. From there they will see the church Ministry Site Profile that we created in the last few months.

Another place pastors can see that

we are in the call process is our own website. The first thing you see now when you go to our website is a box saying that we are in the process of calling a pastor.

Since we are a vacation destination it is very possible a pastor visiting our area might look at our website to get some idea of who we are. They may become interested and seek more information. Lay people visiting our website will also see this message and may know of a pastor who could be interested.

If you haven't seen our new website, I'd encourage you to take a look. It is new as of a few weeks ago and it has been receiving good reviews.

One more source of candidates is our own congregation. It may be that someone here knows of a pastor they think will be a good fit. If you do know of someone, let myself or another committee know and we can talk about it.

Essentially all candidates, no matter how they hear about our opening or how they become interested will go through the synod to contact us. I think pastors know this, but if I, or another committee member is contacted directly we will encourage them to contact the synod.
