One of the few things I remember about the Greek language I learned in seminary is from a Bible Story about Jesus. to be Bood Stewards of Bod's Creation

"The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." Psalms 24:1

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." Genesis 2:15

Stewardship is the responsible care and use of our earth's resources, recognizing that all belongs to God. Our Creator has given us the privilege of enjoying and caring for what God has created. Bethlehem takes seriously our calling to be good stewards of God's earth. Our solar panels are just one way we can express that stewardship.

- Bethlehem can show community leadership by promoting green and renewable energy resources and educating our community.
- Bethlehem's unused energy generated by our solar array goes into the electrical grid to be used by others within our community. This allows our electric utilities to not rely as much on expensive backup systems.
- Bethlehem can help keep electrical costs down for our entire community by encouraging and operating renewable energy resources.

On Nov II, 2022, Bethlehem's 21.5kW solar array was put into operation to provide over 90% of Bethlehem's non-heating electrical needs. Only 6 weeks later on Dec 23, 2022, a powerful winter storm tore 16 of Bethlehem's solar panels off the roof. Frustrated and disappointed, Bethlehem reaffirmed our commitment to renewable energy. The design problems were identified, reengineered, and repaired by TruNorth Solar. On June 27, 2023, the repaired solar array was put back into operation.

<u>Note:</u> There is a laptop computer set up in the narthex that monitors our solar production both instantaneously and historically online. Feel free to take a look at the solar electricity production of our array when you are in the narthex.

Our Creator's Toolbox Includes

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters." Genesis 1:1-2

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

I have been thinking about something Jonathan Rova talked about in his June 4th sermon. He mentioned how the Genesis creation story requires both God and humans. This is different from many creation stories requiring only the gods with humans as bystanders. And it is different than some modern creation stories in which God plays no part. Jonathan emphasized how in this creation story there is a purpose and that humans share in that purpose as stewards of God's creation. And Jonathan noted the liturgical nature of the story. We could hear the cadence of the story as Jess Markusen read it at that service. We could feel the rhythm of the creative power of God as the

purpose of creation unfolded day by day in

that story.

Reflecting on the earth as being "formless and empty" I have to wonder what brought

light, vibrancy, and spice to it. I suggest that one of the tools our Creator uses is randomness. I suspect that most people think of randomness as sort of a bland soup of numbers that all stay close to an average with a little bit of variation evenly distributed around that center. What an odd notion that God would use randomness as a vehicle to add color and life to a formless and empty earth. However, as a former research physicist, I believe randomness has been misunderstood.

As a researcher, the simulations I wrote to model phenomena required a random number generator. I began to appreciate how difficult it is to create a truly random sequence of numbers. I also began to recognize how different true randomness looks compared to our preconceived expectations. I have found that when people look at a random sequence of numbers, they would conclude that the sequence of numbers does not seem very random to them. That is because truly random number sequences have remarkable flurries of activity and temporary patterns that do not seem like coincidence to us.

I was talking to my daughter, Cecelia, about randomness and she told me how Apple created a truly random shuffle feature for your music lists. Users complained that it was not working because there were too many songs by the same artist or genre in a row. Apple had to change their shuffle from a truly random shuffle to a more evenly distributed variety of music in the way Apple users expected a random shuffle to behave. How many times have you in a card game accused someone of not properly shuffling the cards because of the patterns you see in the cards that were dealt? How can this be random? Why are games of chance so exciting? Because the results are so unpredictable and full of spice, flavor, and color.

We misunderstand what randomness is. There is nothing boring about randomness. What a great tool for God to wield while forming creation. Our Creator choosing to use randomness as one vehicle for creation does not result in a gray monotone world but in a vibrant, colorful world full of amazing patterns and what to us seem like improbable coincidence. It results in a creation with a purpose.

Mission Endoument Fund Scholarships Awarded

Mission Endowment Fund

Bethlehem Lutheran established a Mission Endowment Fund in 2001. Donation to the funds are sent to and managed by the ELCA Foundation in Chicago. The investment earnings from the fund are then used to support initiatives and programs in four designated categories:

- Outreach to missions, programs and initiatives within our local community and Synod.
- 2. Outreach to missions, programs, and initiatives of the ELCA in the U.S. and the World.
- 3. Funding for Bethlehem capital improvements, debt reduction, and/or building programs.
- 4. Funding for other causes and programs that enhance the mission outreach of Bethlehem.

This spring the Mission Endowment Committee and Church Council decided to give \$2000 to Bethlehem's Youth budget to be used as seed money for summer "camperships" and/or other youth programming.



It was also decided to grant three \$1000 scholarships to CCHS 2023 graduates: Rowan Lindholm, Katie Peck and J Shannon. All three applicants have

been involved in congregational and community activities and submitted thoughtful and sincere statements regarding their faith journeys. They are very worthy of this support as they begin their post-secondary education. (J was able to use this and receive \$500 matching funds by Bethel.)

Donations to the Mission Endowment Fund are always welcome and are truly "gifts that keep on giving." Brochures outlining the fund in more detail are available in the church narthex.

Concordia Congregational Scholarship Award

Bethlehem Lutheran Church has recently become a part of the Concordia Congregational Scholarship Program, thanks to a Concordia College alumni and supporter who generously donated funds to the church for this purpose. The program provides an opportunity for a member of Bethlehem who attends Concordia College in

Moorhead, MN, to receive a \$1,000 scholarship from the church, which is then matched by the college in the amount of \$500. This scholarship is renewable up to four years per student.

Bethlehem is pleased to announce that **Rowan Lindholm**, who is attending Concordia for the 2023–24 academic year, has been awarded a \$1000 scholarship as well as the \$500 match. We are happy to support our youth who are interested in furthering their education at one of our fine ELCA colleges in this manner.

Bethlehem is very proud of these fine young adults and wishes them every success as they pursue their educational and career goals. In the award announcement letter to these students, Janet Simonen (on behalf of the Mission Endowment Committee) encouraged these exceptional students: "May your faith in Christ be with you as you embark on this journey."

Prayer Warriors

Bethlehem's Prayer Chain is available to provide comfort to members, families and friends who are going through a difficult time. The prayer chain



receives a request, which is simply asking the Prayer Warriors join in prayer, and pass the chain along. The idea is that the more people you have praying together, the more amplified the power of the prayer. The chain leader likes to speak with the person first for permission and makes sure they would want and appreciate our help. Specific requests generally include prayers for health and well-being, and some requests may be for prayers of hope through difficult life decisions or for a peaceful transition from this world. Requests may be kept in confidence within the chain members. If ok'd for public knowledge, these requests are generally added to BLC's Prayer Request List.

Our Prayer Warriors could use some extra people (links) on the chain to help in amplifying prayer requests. 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
