Throughout the Old Testament God continues to remind the Israelites who they are, and who God is. So this month I want to take a lesson from the scriptures and remind us of a bit of our story this past year:

January through July Bethlehem continued to gather in worship using pulpit supply from many different pastors and leaders from inside our congregation and beyond.

In January Bethlehem activated your call process paperwork and started looking for candidates to be you next pastor.

Our well loved Mindy Jacobsen (sadly) resigned from her position as Youth Director as she and her family moved to Alaska for Jens' job.

July 12th your newly called pastor led his first service with The Average Worship Band. (That's right, I've only been around for 6 months.)

We had our Fall Harvest Dinner, and our annual Bake Sale and Lunch led by the BLCW.

In the fall 14 students started confirmation (2 of whom are from our collaboration with Lutsen Lutheran!), and 6 of our students Confirmed their Faith.

Twelve students, middle and high school, went on our Fall Retreat to Cragun's.

Our Men's Bible Study, weekly Text Study, and Women's Circle continued to offer people a chance to study scripture together in Fellowship.

November 5th the congregation unanimously voted to fund and hire a Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries. And November 12th we started our Stewardship Drive to responsibly plan for the increase needed to fund the new position.

We celebrated Christmas Eve with 3 services of Lessons and Carols with Holy Communion. (Thank you to ALL of the volunteers that made this Holiday season so special with decorations, an impressive tree, beautiful music and so much more.

As we look back at the past year, let's be intentionally thankful for ALL of the things that God has done for us and through us. And as we look to the future, let's join together in hope for all that God is yet to do! (Isaiah 43:19 - see the devotion)

Devotions

"I am about to do a new thing;
now it springs forth; do you not perceive it?

I will make a way in the wilderness

and rivers in the desert."

Isaiah 43:19

Last month in my devotion I talked about how the Israelites were taken into captivity in Babylon. This month our text is a Promise from God to lead the people back to the Promised Land. God says words that frequently echo through my head, "I am about to do a new thing..."

We just finished the Christmas season, where so much of our worship and celebrations are entrenched in tradition. At our Christmas Eve service we try to sing as many of the traditionally popular hymns that we can, we read the same scriptures, we have the same meals. But God promises that God is doing a new thing.

That doesn't mean that our traditions have to change, but it does mean that God does a new thing within those traditions. It means that God shows up in new and powerful ways. God speaks to us through a line in a hymn that we hadn't noticed before, or opens our eyes to it's meaning in a new way. God's word is living and active, and anytime it's spoken aloud God shows up and uses it in new ways. God is with us in our celebrations, meals, and gatherings in new ways — bringing light and love into our relationships.

As we enter a new year, look for what God is up to in your routines and traditions, and in the mundane parts of your life...because God is always at work. God is always up to something. Let the promise God made to the Israelites all those years ago echo throughout space and time, and be for you today: "I am about to do a new thing."

Update: Mission Endowment Fund

Bethlehem Lutheran established a Mission Endowment Fund in 2001. Donations to the fund are sent to and managed by the ELCA Foundation in Chicago. The investment earnings from the fund are then used to support initiatives and programs in four designated categories:

- Outreach to missions and programs within our local community and synod.
- 2. Outreach to national and international ELCA initiatives.
- 3. Funding for Bethlehem capital improvements, debt reduction, and/or building programs.
- 4. Funding for other causes that enhance the mission of Bethlehem.

The Mission Endowment Committee had \$9,000 to distribute for 2023. \$5,000 was awarded In the Spring (three \$1,000 scholarships to graduating seniors and \$2,000 in summer "camperships" for youth). At its in December, the committee voted to award the final \$4,000 as follows: \$1,800 to Bethlehem for an additional camera to stream services and meetings, \$900 to Lutheran World Relief, \$900 to Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, \$200 to Ruby's Pantry, and \$200 to the Violence Prevention Center.

Donations to the Mission Endowment Fund are always welcome and are truly "gifts that keep on giving". Brochures outlining the fund in more detail are available in the church narthex.



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Our January Mission of the Month is our local **Ruby's Pantry**.

At our December meeting a committee couple of our members shared that Ruby's Pantry has had a 50% increase in the number of people needing gift certificates, to cover their shares, at the last few distributions. On December 6th, the Cook County Ruby's Pantry **Facebook** page shared following:

The rising costs of food, utilities, and rent have pushed family budgets to breaking! We have nearly exhausted our Ruby's Pantry bank account and it is time to ask for help from our community of caring people!

More about Ruby's

Ruby A Flodin was the inspiration behind the Pop-Up Pantries and in honor of her big heart a ministry has been created with the same values: taking the resources God has entrusted us with and turning them into that which supports families and communities.

Ruby's Pantry is for anyone that is looking to extend their monthly grocery budget. For a \$25 bundle donation, you will receive an abundance of groceries. There is no income or residency requirement. Ruby's Pantry is not government funded and 501-C3 is a organization. Each donation is used to cover operational costs like trucking, gas, and warehouse staff. All of the food is donated by corporate food donors making it possible to reach more families each month at 85 locations across Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota and Iowa.

Local distribution is on the second Tuesday of the month, from 4:30-6:30 pm. Currently the distribution site is at the High School, through the Eagle doors. (The site does vary throughout the year, so be aware.)

Volunteers unpack the truck; put the food on tables and "shares" are created by placing one of each item put into each bag. Once all shares are packed, they are put on wagons/carts and taken to the trunks of waiting cars!

Cook County Climate Action Plan

We've heard it a thousand times: global average temperatures are rising due to human activity. In Minnesota, the climate crisis makes its presence known through drought, dangerous wildfire smoke, changing weather patterns, predicted impacts to Lake Superior water levels, habitat loss, algae blooms, pests, rising insurance rates, record heat waves, and brown Christmases. The greatest burden of these impacts will be felt by marginalized communities and the youngest generations.

The constant onslaught of bad climate news (and bad news in general) often pushes us to nihilism, to numbness, and to the most dangerous choice: inaction. However, I come to you today with opportunities to take easy, effective action that has potential to be more impactful than your simple vote.



I (Naomi Tracy-Hegg) and my friends (Olya Wright and Martine Redshaw, among others) have a history of local climate action: we ushered in a Grand Marais Climate Action Plan in 2019, Climate followed by Emergency Resolutions at the city and county levels

in 2022. We've undertaken similar projects in Lake County and even dabbled in state-level advocacy. This year, we're asking Cook County to commit to drafting and passing a Climate Action Plan (CAP). This committal would take the form of a CAP resolution.

It would be wrong to say that Cook County hasn't already been taking climate action. The County has investigated electrifying some of our fleet, and the Capital Improvement Plan addresses efficiency and electrification of County buildings. However, if we want to attain the emissions reductions necessary to curb the climate crisis, a more ambitious, cohesive plan is clearly necessary.

What, then, can I do to support this initiative? you may ask. Here's how you can help:

Show up.

The single most effective way to support this legislation is to show up when the resolution is brought before the County Board. The exact date is yet to be determined, but it will likely be in February. To get email updates about the exact dates, you can add your email to our petition.

Sign our petition. The petition text reads:

Sign and support our local initiative to create a Cook County Climate Action Plan. Join us and show Cook County that we call for immediate action on the climate crisis by passing a resolution to create a powerful climate action plan. Add your voice to demonstrate support for the Resolution and to demand that OUR county takes meaningful action

Attuned to Kids Needs

In some congregations it's obvious that people care about kids that aren't their own. It makes a difference. Children thrive when they make connections with caring non-family adults. Many studies, including one from the University of MN indicate that youth who have frequent high-quality interaction with non-parental adults have fewer behavioral problems than youth without such connections. Positive outcomes of strong adult relationships include positive school motivation, improved mental health, lower rates of substance abuse and less school misconduct.



Youth can find supportive and caring adults in sports, scouting, 4-H, music programs, etc. It is my deep hope that

congregations can provide this holy space, also space where children are encouraged, supported, mentored, and prayed for by caring adults. This is what we as Church members signed up for at every baptism in our Church.

The words are: "People of God, do you promise to support (this child), and pray for them in their new life in Christ?" All those assembled say: "We will". When we say this, we don't necessarily know what we're getting ourselves into! The liturgical rite in Evangelical Lutheran Worship doesn't say "the congregation" or "members", it says " the assembly" meaning that whether you're an insider, an outsider or someone who just popped in for that day, you are part of a caring web for the newly baptized. YOU made promises.






Pollinator Sanctuary
